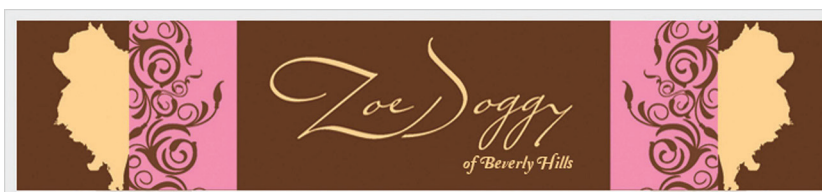

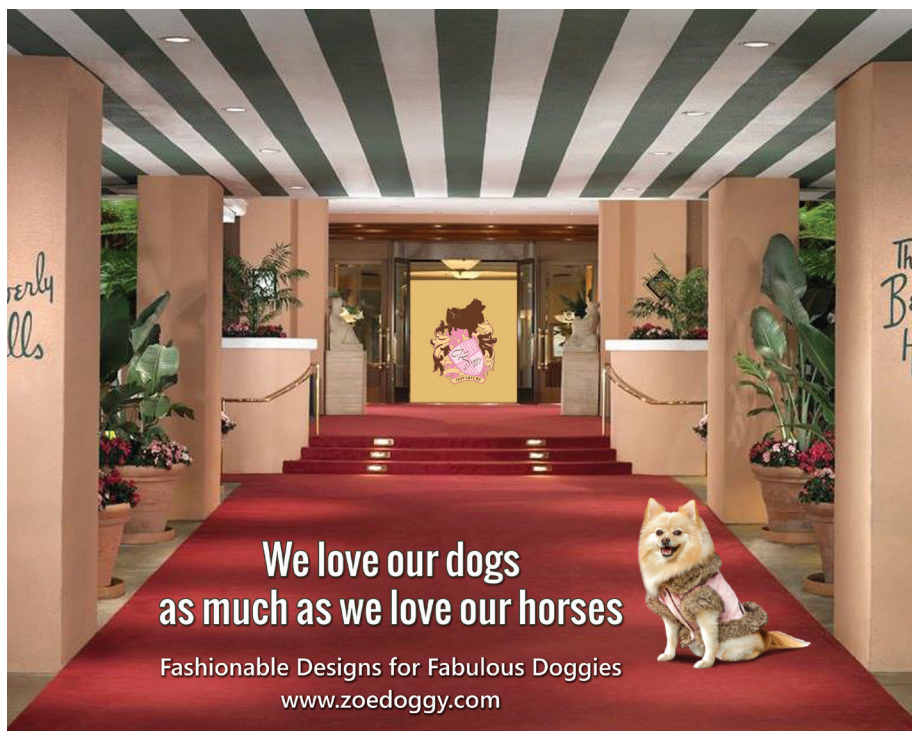

This spring while you're deciding on what plants to plant in your garden, please do some research while you decide on what to plant! A lot of plants are toxic to your pet. If they eat them, they may not even realize that they are toxic. There are over hundreds on different toxic plants, and some common ones we plant in our yards can be found below:

- Acorn Squash
- Bamboo
- Banana
- Blue Daisy
- Cape Marigold
- Chicken and Hens
- Christmas Cactus
- Cucumber
- Day Lilies
- Easter Daisy

Besides these ten that are listed above, there are close to 500 toxic plants that are EXTREMELY harmful to your dog. A lot of them have side effects that a veterinarian cannot reverse once your pet has eaten them.

Make sure when you're picking your flowers for this spring's flower bed that you do your research prior to planting your yard. Double check with the ASPCA website to make sure you are not planting anything dangerous!
